

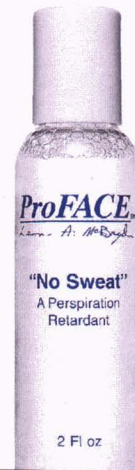

FACE BLOCK

In concert videos, singers' bodies often look drenched in perspiration—and yet their faces remain dry, their makeup perfect. It's not the work of some freakishly long-lasting cosmetic. According to New York City makeup artist Kristofer Buckle, it's due to ProFace No Sweat (at right), a facial antiperspirant created to help prosthetic makeup adhere. "I apply it on a performer doing a very athletic show," he says. NYC dermatologist [David Colbert, MD](#), a favorite of Broadway song-and-dancers, cautions against using No Sweat regularly. "It contains aluminum chlorohydrate," he says, "which can be irritating and cause a rash or breakouts." He advises two heat-filled No Sweat test runs before a big event to check skin's reaction.
